Two Traditions of Jaina Cosmology

Traditional Indian thought on the universe is represented by Hinduism, Buddhism and Jainism. Of them the Jaina cosmology has a long history and seems to be most influential because it developed the idea of *lokapuruṣa*, but so far few papers or works have explored its details.

Here first we discuss a short history of cosmology in Jainism and examine two opinions on the structure of the universe according to the main sects of Jainism.

The oldest information of Jaina cosmology is found in an āgamic work *Viyāhapaṇṇatti* or *Bhagavati* and later the Jainas developed the ideas which they expressed āgama works and others. We can see the concrete form of the Jaina cosmology in paintings of the middle ages.

Deferent thoughts on the universe appear in the standard work of Jainism; *Tattvārtha Sūtra*. The third and fourth chapters of the book deal with structure of the three parts of this universe. Readings of the sūtras in them supported by the two sects are quite different from each other while such difference seldom happens in other chapters. This seems to suggest that cosmology in Jainism has two fundamental sources.
